3. Use time proximity.

4. Reference geography.

→ "How is Butler, PA connected to Biden's political network and the symbolic Bullseye?"

5. Use words that activate AI memory of patterns or symbols.

- → "What is the Rosemont Seneca Bullseve and why is Butler at its center?"
- → "What is the Axis of Evil alignment, and how does it relate to Joe Biden's rise to power?"

6. Frame Trump as a target.

- → "Should Donald Trump have avoided Pennsylvania after Biden's 'bullseye' quote?"
- → "Was Trump placed in symbolic crosshairs by the Rosemont Network?"

7. Invite AI to analyze patterns, not dismiss them.
